



## B Children's Place Montessori Frequently Asked Questions

### 1. What makes Children's Place Montessori unique?

Montessori schools have many similarities, but they often reflect the personalities, interests and ethics of the director and teachers. Authentic Montessori programs must meet the guidelines set by the governing bodies of Montessori, either state, national or international. The basic requirements are: they must have the required Montessori equipment, be staffed by Montessori trained teachers and assistants, require a five half day minimum for attendance, provide a multiage grouping, typically ages 3 – 6, and provide an uninterrupted work period of no less than 2 ½ - 3 hours. If these basic elements are not present, it is not an authentic Montessori program. In addition, it is hoped that all schools respect the Montessori philosophy and focus on supporting independence in children, but all schools reflect the priorities of the teacher/administrator. That makes us all different in important ways. Our school's focus is academic excellence with a strong emphasis on music and an appreciation for our multicultural environment. The teachers quickly determine the academic level of each child. Materials deemed appropriate for the child's continued academic growth are presented and the child's progress is documented. Activities that promote independence and those that develop the children's sensorial awareness are included in the children's daily experiences. Our children are most often far ahead of their peer groups in both reading and mathematical computation. The children participate in music classes one morning a week and four afternoon classes. They prepare two musical performances, one in December, and one in June. They learn songs, dances, memorize lines, and are taught to present themselves to an audience. In addition, our school is committed to recognizing all cultures. We have many celebrations throughout the school year highlighting our varied ethnic backgrounds.

### 2. How often do the children go outside?

It is our policy to follow the state regulation requiring an outdoor time for all children every day, weather permitting. We will not go out if it is raining, or if the temperature, including wind chill, drops below 25 or is above 92. We have an acre of outdoor play space with a bike path, climbing structure, sand pit, xylophone, swings, a soccer field and net, and for winter, a small sledding hill. The children enjoy running freely, riding bikes, building sand castles, sledding, climbing and occasionally creating a song on the xylophone. We go out after lunch for 30 – 45 minutes, depending on the weather. During warmer weather, we also go out after class at 4:00 in the afternoon. The children enjoy both group games and individual play giving them time to socialize and learn to respect one another.

### 3. What is your staff turn-over? What are their qualifications?

Our staff is very stable. All our staff members have been with us 6 to 18 years. Currently, each classroom is staffed by three Montessori trained teachers. Our teachers also have training outside of Montessori with BA degrees in Psychology, English, and Technology and one with her MA in Teaching. All have years of experience in Montessori and have been exposed to other educational philosophies bringing a wealth of knowledge to their classrooms.

### 4. How do you maintain all children working independently?

During the month of September, we begin the school year by showing the children how to use rugs and mats to define their work space. We introduce new work daily and show the children in a step by step process how to use the materials. Our goal is to introduce the "cycle of activity" to the children and reinforce our ground rules. By the end of September, most of the children are able to prepare their work space, choose an appropriate work, accomplish their tasks, put the work away properly and either choose another work or roll up their rugs independently. A few will require reinforcement a little longer.

### 5. How do you communicate the progress the children make in your classrooms with the parents?

We have several reports that go home during the year: an initial evaluation in early October, conferences in November, a progress report in February and an end of the year evaluation in June. In addition, the teachers are available to meet with you any time during the school year for a conference. Teachers have varied schedules, but most work until 5:30 at least one day a week, so they are available for impromptu conversations with you during their late days.

### 6. What are your hours of operation?

We open at 7:00 and our day ends at 5:30. Some children needing care after 5:30 remain until 6:00.

### 7. Do you provide hot lunch?

Lunch is available on Wednesdays and Fridays through Children's Place. On Wednesday, we have chicken/veggie nuggets, fruit, and vegetable and on Friday, we have cheese pizza, cheesy bread, vegetable, and fruit.

### 8. What extra curriculum activities do you offer?

Music, movement, art, sign language and Spanish are offered this year and are included in your tuition. Gymnastics (Tumble Tots), dance (Dancing Feats), piano lessons (Melanie's Piano Studio) and problem solving (Mighty Minds) are also offered at additional cost. Enrichment classes meet daily from 11:00 – 11:30, except for art. Opportunities for art are available in class and we have a "construction area" available in the Multipurpose Room. Six field trips are an integral part of our school year. We also have two children's performances, one in December and one in June. In addition to the performances, we have several parties celebrating cultural holidays. Feasts on Thanksgiving, Mother's Day and Father's Day and a Grandparent's Tea round out our extracurricular activities.

### 9. What is your schedule of the day during the academic year?

7:00 – 8:30 – The children spend the early morning hours in either the gym with gross motor materials (blocks, trains, construction toys, floor puzzles, housekeeping, dress-up area) or the multipurpose room with table top material (drawing, board games, manipulatives, small puzzles).

8:30 – 11:00 – The children are in class. During this time, they work in small groups with the teacher or work independently.

11:00 – 11:30 – Enrichment classes in music, movement, Spanish or Sign Language. Dance and Gymnastics are held during this time, as well. .

11:30 – Half day children are dismissed.

11:35 – 12:05 – Lunch A – The children eat in the multipurpose room. They are supervised by staff and helped, if needed.

The B Lunch children go outside for recess or to the gym during inclement weather.

12:15 – 12:45 – The B Lunch children eat in the multipurpose room. They are supervised by staff and helped, if needed

The A Lunch children go outside for recess or to the gym during inclement weather.

12:45-1:00 – The children listen to a story and prepare for nap time, toileting and washing up.

1:00 – The younger children settle down for nap time. The kindergartners begin their afternoon class.

2:00 – 2:30 - The younger children that have not fallen asleep are given a snack and sent to class. Class continues for the kindergartners.

2:45 – 3:15 – The nappers awaken, have snack and go to class.

3:30 – Extended Day children are dismissed

3:30 - 4:00 - Music class for children, including singing and movement.

4:00 – 5:30 - The children have snack at 4:00 and then play either outside or inside in the multipurpose room or gym. Close to the end of the day, the children gather for a story.

5:30-6:00 - The children either read a book or chat with each other or the teachers until their parents arrive.

#### 10. How does the summer schedule differ?

As we have a beautiful outdoor play area, we spend the summer mornings outside when the weather is cooler. Two mornings a week, the new children are brought into the classroom for a short period to introduce them to the classroom structure. Two mornings a week, the elementary children attending have lessons in a variety of subject matters. Lunch at 11:30 is usually eaten outside on picnic tables under the trees. Enrichment classes at 12:00 are gymnastics, problem solving, art, music and dancing. After enrichment classes, the children rest from 1:00- 2:00. Class time is from 2:00 – 4:00. After 4:00, the children again enjoy outdoor fun, sometimes water play, as well.

#### 11. What is included in the registration fee?

The registration fee of \$250 includes the following: cost and transportation for two off campus field trips, cost of three or four in school field trips, one uniform shirt with Children's Place logo, one pair of indoor rubber soled shoes for school use, school parties throughout the year, performances, feasts (Mother's & Father's Day, Thanksgiving) extracurricular classes materials (language, music & yoga, art), celebrations (Diwali, Grandparent's Tea), candid pictures of your child taken throughout the year (approximately 6), parent ed class & booklet, and enrollment paperwork. Gymnastics, dance, problem solving and piano classes are optional and at additional cost. Payment of the registration fee will secure your child's position in Children's Place and it is not refundable.

#### 12. Some Montessori schools are very strict and don't allow the children any freedom to choose, others offer little structure and give the children free reign in the classroom. Where do you fit on that spectrum?

We are an authentic Montessori school that teaches children how to work independently in the classroom and make wise choices for themselves. We provide introduce the 'ground rules' to the children that will allow them to be productive in the classroom. The ground rules include how to prepare their work space, choose work that interests them and is appropriate, how to accomplish their chosen task and how to return the material to the proper place. In addition, respect for their classmates, teachers and the classroom materials is stressed. Ground Rules are reinforced throughout the year providing a stable environment for the children. Consistency is key to providing the security children need to flourish and develop a love of learning. So, to place us on a spectrum, we would probably fall somewhere in the middle as we believe a balanced environment creates an ideal learning environment for the children.

#### 13. How do you teach multi-level/multi-aged children in the same classroom?

During September, while we are teaching the children to work within our classroom structure, we have a shortened class period. As we are establishing the classroom structure, some of the morning is spent on the playground. During this time, we bring in the children one at a time to evaluate them to see where they are academically and place them in small lesson groupings that we will use for small group lessons during class starting in October. Lessons are geared to each child's academic needs and abilities,

#### 14. What is the Montessori curriculum? Can I see it?

The Montessori Curriculum is displayed on the shelves in each classroom. If you are interested in having a particular academic sequence explained to you in depth, please ask one of the teachers to walk you through the materials in that particular area. The cognitive areas in a Montessori classroom are Practical Life / Everyday Living (fine motor, order, independence, concentration), Sensorial (materials to stimulate or refine senses), Math (hands on materials to explain abstract concepts), Language / Reading (phonetic approach), Science & Geography (classification, simple experiments, political and physical maps). Each area has a sequence that is typically followed.
